Dear Friends in Christ

It is lovely to see many of you coming to church once more. We still have our COVID regulations in force and distancing which makes La Siesta Church a very safe place to be for you to worship in so we would encourage all those who are considering returning to do so and try it for yourself. We are sure that, if you are still staying at home, you are missing your Holy Communion. At the moment we receive only the Sacred Host and in that we receive the fullness of the Blessed Sacrament when we make our Holy Communion. Our team of volunteers who clean and disinfect the church pay a great deal of attention to their duties and we thank them wholeheartedly for their dedication.

Father Richard can now, at a suitable distance, have a chat with you outside after the service and he would love to see you again.

A big, big thank you to all who have taken out standing orders. It has helped us a great deal in budgeting and planning. You may not be aware that we have paid our Common Fund payment of €4626.88 ahead of the scheduled date to receive a discount. We have also had to pay €617.10 for repairs to the plumbing system in the Chaplaincy office and we will have some Archdeaconry dues later this year. We really wish to encourage you to think about paying by standing order for us to plan our expenditure. The bank details are provided below. If you need help with this, we are here to show you how to set up a Standing Order.

THE PANDEMIC AND THE MONTHS AHEAD

1. Lago Jardín Church will remain closed until further notice. This is because of the difficulty of social distancing in the church and its already limited capacity.
2. There is to be a building project to renovate the church but **Los Balcones church is now closed for the foreseeable future. It will re-open but it is impossible to say when. All services for the Chaplaincy will be held at La Siesta.**
3. La Siesta - these services will be for the whole Chaplaincy so please make every effort to be there and support the liturgical life of the Chaplaincy as we begin again in limited circumstances.

The live-streamed liturgies continue:

1. Go to <https://www.facebook.com/groups/chaplaintorrevieja> and ask to join the group.
2. You will be asked three questions. Please complete them and agree to the rules of the group.
3. When the livestream starts it will appear on your device in the Facebook stream. The stream will start a few minutes before the broadcast so you can get settled in. You can only see this when I start the livestream.

"Participants in a streamed service of Holy Communion should not be encouraged to place bread and wine before their screens. Joining together to share in the one bread and the one cup as those physically present to one another is integral to the service of Holy Communion; ... and it is not helpful to suggest otherwise. Any idea of the 'remote consecration' of the bread and wine should be avoided."

The words above are an extract from a letter from Bishop Robert and Bishop David from 2nd April 2020. Under Church of England formularies the Priest himself must set the bread and wine upon the Altar which is going to be consecrated during the Eucharist.

This post underlines The Church of England position.

Making a Spiritual Communion. Something recommended for us all each day when we cannot participate in the Holy Eucharist.

Even if we are watching a livestreamed Mass (and the times of our Chaplaincy livestreamed celebrations of the Eucharist are listed in the newsletter) we are invited to pause when the Priest receives Holy Communion and make our own spiritual communion. We can say it silently to ourselves or speak it out loud. In this way we are joined with Our Lord in his suffering and death for the world and we are united to His Most Sacred Heart. Dear friends

On this Solemnity of Corpus Christi (The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ) I greet you and ask that our thanksgiving for such a great gift we receive in the Holy Eucharist may be

reflected in hearts of joy and praise. As we share in the Body of Christ may we truly be the Body of Christ in this place. It is a day set aside by the Church in praise and thanksgiving for the gift of the Blessed Sacrament. I hope and pray, that as we receive the Holy Eucharist, such a great gift from God may be transformative for all our hearts and souls. How do we reflect the holy joy of being a Eucharistic community? As more of us return to the Altar, may we treasure more and more this holy and precious gift - a gift that many have missed. Our Lord Jesus Christ waits for us all in the Eucharist.

A short Los Balcones update. The renovations have not yet started. It will be a slow process I fear. However, everything belonging to the Chaplaincy has been taken out of the church and I want to thank the team of people who did all the hard work of relocating it to Lago Jardín whilst Lago Jardín church is closed. Thank you. As soon as there is any update I will let you know.

All the parishes in the Church of England (and chaplaincies in this diocese) have made great strides in the complexity of new arrangements which have been introduced for Safeguarding. This Chaplaincy has attained Level Three status (the top tier) which means we have completed everything that needs to be done. We must congratulate Anna Horsnell, our Safeguarding Officer, for her indefatigable work and attention to detail on this and for all that she has achieved for us. Thank you, Anna for that you have done and all that you continue to do. Thank you to all who have co-operated with Anna to get to this stage.

To conclude it is important that everyone in the Chaplaincy understands something for the avoidance of doubt. To minister in the Church of England as a priest or to take a service in the Church of England as a priest you must have a licence or Permission to Officiate from the Bishop. You cannot take a service in the name of the Church of England without this. Neither can you, if you are licensed or have Permission to Officiate, take a service or function as a member of the clergy unless you have completed what is called Level 2 Safeguarding Training. Clergy with Permission to Officiate can only function at the invitation of the Parish Priest (or, in the Diocese in Europe, the Chaplain.) Clergy not licensed in the Church of England cannot take services in the name of the Church of England and neither can they be invited to do so. Here we are talking about the Church of England – the Provinces of Canterbury and York and not any other jurisdictions. The situation is much more rigorous now and these rules have to be upheld to the highest degree. I hope that is helpful.

May God bless us all as we praise God for the gift of the Body and Blood of Christ.

The blood of Christ can purify our inner self

Now Christ has come, as the high priest of all the blessings which were to come. He has passed through the greater, the more perfect tent, which is better than the one made by men's hands because it is not of this created order; and he has entered the sanctuary once and for all, taking with him not the blood of goats and bull calves, but his own blood, having won an eternal redemption for us. The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer are sprinkled on those who have incurred defilement and they restore the holiness of their outward lives; how much more effectively the blood of Christ, who offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to God through the eternal Spirit, can purify our inner self from dead actions so that we do our service to the living God.

He brings a new covenant, as the mediator, only so that the people who were called to an eternal inheritance may actually receive what was promised: his death took place to cancel the sins that infringed the earlier covenant.

Gospel

Mark 14:12-16,22-26

This is my body; this is my blood

On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed, his disciples said to Jesus, 'Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the passover?' So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the city and you will meet a man carrying a pitcher of water. Follow him, and say to the owner of the house which he enters, "The Master says: Where is my dining room in which I can eat the passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large upper room furnished with couches, all prepared. Make the preparations for us there.' The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover.

And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them. 'Take it,' he said 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it to them, and all drank from it, and he said to them, 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly, I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.'

After psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives.

Homily

Sitting together for a meal can generate a special feeling of togetherness. Each of us will have our own memories of table companionship or fellowship. Many of these will be happy experiences of celebration and laughter, of love received and shared. Some memories of table fellowship may be sad, times when we were more aware of one who was absent than of those who were present. Jesus shared table many times with his disciples. It is likely that, when sharing food with his disciples, he also shared with them his vision of God's kingdom. At table, the disciples imbibed something of Jesus' mind and heart and spirit. Of all the meals he shared with them, the meal that stayed in their memory more than any other was their last meal together, what came to be known as the last supper. Today's gospel gives us Mark's account, his word-picture, of that last supper.

This last meal Jesus shared with his disciples stood out in their memory, capturing the imagination of generations of disciples right up to ourselves. He did more than share his vision with the disciples; he gave them himself in a way he had never done before, and in a way that anticipated the death he would die for them and for all, on the following day. In giving himself in the form of the bread and wine of the meal, he was declaring himself to be their food and drink. In calling on them to take and eat, to take and drink, he was asking them to take their stand with him, to give themselves to him as he was giving himself to them.

It was because of that supper and of what went on there that we are here in this church today. Jesus intended his last supper to be a beginning rather than an end. It was the first Eucharist. Ever since that meal, the church has gathered regularly in his name, to do and say what he did and said at that last supper — taking bread and wine, consecrating both, breaking the bread and giving both for disciples to eat and drink. We receive the Lord's Body and Blood

Jesus continues to give himself as food and drink to his followers. He also continues to put it up to his followers to take their stand with him, to take in all he stands for, living by his values, walking in his way, even if that means the cross. Whenever we come to the Eucharist and receive the Blessed Sacrament, we are making a number of important statements. We are acknowledging Jesus as our bread of life, as the one who alone can satisfy our deepest hungers. We are also declaring that we will throw in our lot with him, as it were, that we will follow in his way and be faithful to him all our lives, in response to his faithfulness to us. In that sense, celebrating the Eucharist is not something we do lightly. Our familiarity with the Eucharist and the frequency with which we celebrate it can dull our senses to the full significance of what we are doing. Every time we gather for the Eucharist, we find ourselves once more in that upper room with the first disciples, and the last supper with all it signified is present again to us.
